There is wide debate on the underlying causes of the sexual abuse crisis in our Holy Catholic Church. Blame has been attributed to homosexual priests, lack of women in the priesthood, and celibacy, among others. Several studies have failed to identify a single cause. However, these studies make it clear that much of the blame can be put on Clericalism, something Pope Francis describes as "the gravest of sins." Priests who put themselves on a pedestal or are put there by parishioners, often feel empowered and entitled to do whatever they choose to do. That feeling of entitlement is aided by the church hierarchy seeking to protect the institution at all costs.
