Memorable Moments in Diocesan History

To be published each week of the 200th anniversary liturgical year

The Catholic population of Virginia expanded in the years following the Civil War, in part due to Irish immigrants who worked the railroads. Roanoke has long been “rail city,” but until November 19, 1882 the Catholic mass had never been celebrated there. Fittingly, the city’s first mass was celebrated in a rail car: Shenandoah Valley Railroad Passenger Coach, number 6.

From 1877 to 1883, a group of idealists attempted to construct a model Catholic community in rural Charlotte County, Virginia. Named “Keileyville,” after the president of the Irish Catholic Benevolent Union, this Catholic colony attracted 120 residents who farmed the land and built a church. Financial mismanagement and crop failures doomed the colony, but timbers from its church survive, repurposed to help build St. Catherine of Siena church in Clarksville, Virginia.

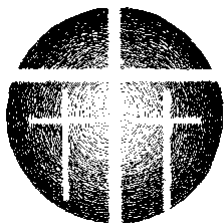

Diocesan Appeal

The diocese has processed donations for Our Lady of Peace totaling \$1,320 of the total \$3,180 we need. So we are almost halfway there (maybe further, once unprocessed gifts are recorded). Our Lady of Peace Parish, COVID-19 Prevention Measures

Passed by Parish Council on March 10, 2020

In response to the coronavirus outbreak, Fr. Jim and the Parish Council have discussed and agreed upon the following guidelines to protect the safety of all parishioners.

If you or someone in your family is sick, stay home.

The Holy Water fonts have been drained and will not be used until further notice.

We ask that you refrain from handshakes during the greeting, handholding during the Our Father, and handshakes during the Sign of Peace. A wave or other appropriate non-contact greeting should be used instead.

For the present time, the Cup of the Precious Blood will not be available. We would like to stress that this regrettable measure is strictly temporary and is taken purely to prevent contagion. The Cup will be restored as soon as conditions regarding COVID-19 have improved sufficiently to render the action prudent.

We ask that you receive the Host in your hands, not on your tongue.

We ask that everyone observe these safeguards in order to protect the safety of all our parishioners. Thank you in advance for your cooperation and understanding.
