UBUNTU A Reflection by Sid Smith

There's a well-known story about an anthropologist who was studying a tribe in Africa. He wrote that one day he placed some sweets in a basket by a tree, and some distance away drew a line in the dirt. He told the children of the tribe to stand behind the line, and explained to them that when he said "go" they should race to the tree, and the first one there would get the treats. To his surprise the children didn't race, but when he said "go" they all held hands and ran to the tree together; then they shared out the treats among themselves. When he asked them why they did this they said, "ubuntu," and explained that none of them could enjoy the treats unless all of them did. No one could be happy, unless all were.

"Ubuntu" is a Zulu word that African Bishop Desmond Tutu described as meaning, "my humanity is inextricably bound up in yours." The counterpart in English would be the word "co-inherence." The idea, however you name it, is ancient and widespread. Most cultures have emphasized it. The only reason it seemed so surprising to the modern anthropologist is because our society emphasizes the individual rather than the group, constantly pushing us to consider "mine" rather than "ours," and "how does this affect me?" rather than "how does this affect my community?"

But ubuntu/co-inherence goes far beyond just interdependence or sharing or empathy. It means that my being and yours are so fundamentally intertwined that our very existence depends on that relationship.

This is Christian. Jesus tells us in the Gospel of John, "I am in the Father, and the Father is in Me." The persons of the Holy Trinity co-inhere in the unity of God. Jesus adds, "I am in my Father, and you are in Me, and I am in you." And, "unless you eat of the flesh of the Son of Man, and drink His blood, you have no life in you." That is, we also co-inhere in Jesus, and his life is our life. Indeed, we only have life insofar as, and to the degree, that it is Jesus' life within us, and our life is in him It is in Him that we receive the gift of ourselves.

In today's gospel Jesus tells his followers that "anyone who welcomes you welcomes me." In the communion of Saints, all co-inhere in one another, literally present in the world as the body of Christ. Ubuntu/co-inherence is particularly expressed in Jesus' insistence that when we meet the sick, the troubled, the beggar at the door, we are actually meeting Him, and as we do to them, so we do to Him. In other words, "my humanity is inextricably bound up in yours."
