The host of the banquet is told to go out to the highways and byways and invite those who are marginalized and neglected by society. The theology (or pathology) of the day was that God was punishing those who were poor or disabled. To invite them challenges the magisterium of that day.

When this Gospel comes, I put on my cowboy hat and sing Garth Brooks' song, "Friends in Low Places." but, the last four verses are troubling. After all the effort at inviting the disenfranchised, someone is being thrown out for not having a "wedding garment"? So why is that incident in there? What is that all about? Well, the last four verses are what we call a "redaction." In the original text, it was only the poor and the lame that were present at the party. But a good reason - the part about the wedding garment was added. Why?

The "wedding garment" is really a baptismal garment. Back then, there was not infant baptism. You were baptized as an adult. Previous to your baptism, you lead a life of sin. Yes, you are forgiven and baptized. But, you also could not judge others for their sin. You could not come to the party with a condescending and arrogant attitude because you, even though you are holy now, are still a sinner.

You should seek solidarity with others who have sinned and were forgiven. The "wedding garment" is a sign of your past sinful life, but also your new life in Christ and your life now of grace. But you still sinned and you cannot put on airs and think you are better than other people. Hence, it is a garment to remind you.

At the Easter Vigil party at St. Victoria, one of the newly baptized said they became a Catholic because they had a pastor who knew what sin was. Oh, happy fault! God writes straight with crooked lines.
