Who appreciates the Father's love more: The prodigal son or the boring stay at home son? (Luke 15:1-32)

The son who took his father's inheritance and squandered it was in a distant country. That meant he was in "another world." It would be like trying to talk sense into someone who is drunk or high on drugs - feeling no pain and lots of denial. Yet, that son "comes to his senses." He ran out of things that made him "high." In addiction and recovery we call that a "moment of clarity." He then thought that he would return to his father. He admits he has a problem and his life is unmanageable. He would try to make amends by apologizing to his father and admitting that he sinned against God (his Higher Power). He has lost dignity and perhaps is coming up the road naked, so they put a robe on him (a robe or stole is given at Baptism as a sign of our dignity in Christ.) His status as son is restored as he receives a ring for his finger. Yet, he is free to stay or run away - freedom - a shoes are given for his feet.

This is an overwhelming story of reconciliation and forgiveness, but the father's generosity continues as there is a party thrown in his honor. The stay at home son is angry. Perhaps he, too, is a "prodigal son" because of his pride and judgements. Perhaps he is boring. Perhaps he never takes risks to have an adventure or even fall in love. Some would find the son who left exciting. "What was it like?" we could ask. "What did you see?" "Did you miss us?" He understands the father's love.

We are not supposed to sin. But we all do. Perhaps after we sinned, we felt forgiven. Perhaps we would not now of forgiveness if we were a "goodie-twoshoes."

It reminds me of Mae West. One time, a lady said to May West, "My goodness, what beautiful pearls!" May West said, "Goodness had nothing to do with it, my dear!" The lady responded, "Well, I never!" and Mae Wet said, "Maybe you should!" No, we should not sin, Mae. But if we do and we are sorry, God gives us the great pearl of his love like the father in the Gospel.

That is called a paradox. There is one answer to a paradox of God's grace. It is called *FAITH.*
